Elements of the article in the “Yearbook of the Institute of East-Central Europe”:

- Author
- Author’s email address
- Author’s affiliation
- Title of the article in English
- Abstract in English (min. 200 / max 250 words)
- Keywords in j. English (at least three)
- Uniform numbering of sections and subsections (1, 1.1, 1.2, etc.)
- Bibliography in alphabetical order, separately for items stored in Cyrillic alphabet
